General Information & Reminders on Grant Claims

Claims: Reminders

- DCJS Grants Management Team makes every effort to have claims reviewed and approved within 30 days of submission (or resubmission if it is negotiated back). After that, it can take up to 10 days for the grantee to receive payment.
- Quarterly claims are due on the 15th day of the month following the end of a quarter (October, January, April, July).
 If these dates fall on the weekend or a holiday, the claim is due on the next business day.

Claims: Reminders

- Do not add attachments to the Details of Expenditures section of your claim unless asked to do so by DCJS.
- Make sure your SAM registration is not expired, otherwise a claim will not be approved.
- Claims cannot be approved if you have not submitted the SOGA or if you have other pending items to include encumbrances or a pending Status Report.

Claims: Common Mistakes

- Reimbursement request does not match what is listed in details of expenditures.
- Items are listed in the wrong category (ex. federal funds are listed as state funds).
- The claim includes items that are not in the approved budget.

Information on American Rescue Plan Act Funds

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds

- Source of ARPA funding is U.S. Department of the Treasury (federal), awarded to Virginia and appropriated through the state budget.
- In both SFY 2022 & 2023, ARPA funding was appropriated to DCJS to "support services to victims of crime..."
- However, the budget language also restricted the use of these funds.

ARPA Funds: SFY 2022

Specific language in SFY 2022:

The Department shall use these funds to support sexual assault and domestic violence applicants of the Victims Services Grant Program for Fiscal Year 2022 such that the amounts reduced from the competitive grant applications for this grant period, due to lack of funding, are fully restored.



ARPA Funds: SFY 2023

Specific language in SFY 2023:

The department shall use these funds to support sexual assault and domestic violence applicants of the Victims Services Grant Program...

...(ARPA) funds over the biennium to go to sexual assault and domestic violence agencies for services for victims of sexual assault and domestic violence...



Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Funding Outlook

- Memos were emailed on Thursday, 10/6, to Victims
 Services Grant Program (VSGP) and Victim/Witness Grant
 Program (VWGP) recipients regarding State Fiscal Year
 2024 funding levels.
 - Emailed from <u>Anya.Shaffer@dcjs.virginia.gov</u>; please email her or your Grant Monitor if you did not receive it.
- Memos indicate that it is anticipated that VSGP and VWGP will receive a one-year renewal for SFY24 (7/1/23 6/30/24) that includes a 10% decrease in the federal VOCA portion of the awards.
- State funding is not impacted by this.





Beyond SFY 2024 is very uncertain.

- Two primary concerns:
 - Balance of the federal Crime Victims Fund
 - 2. DCJS VOCA award amounts v. grant obligations

Federal VOCA Funding

- The federal Crime Victims Fund (CVF) was established by the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) in 1984.
- Money from the CVF is awarded to states and territories by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), to support programs and services for victims of crime.
- Federal revenues deposited into the CVF come from criminal fines, forfeited bail bonds, penalties, and other non-tax revenues.

Federal VOCA Funding


 The amount of VOCA funds allocated from the CVF is determined by Congress in the Appropriations Act and is referred to as the "VOCA Cap."

 Beginning in 2015, there have been significant fluctuations in the VOCA Cap and thus in the amount of VOCA dollars allocated to states.

Federal VOCA Funding: "VOCA Fix Act"

- Increases in VOCA awards coincided with a decrease in deposits into the CVF. This led the balance of the CVF to decline sharply.
- In 2021, the VOCA Fix to Sustain the Crime Victims Fund Act of 2021 ("VOCA Fix Act") was passed.
- The VOCA Fix Act is intended to address long-term sustainability of the CVF, and is not a short-term influx of funds.

- Virginia's federal fiscal year (FFY) 2015 VOCA allocation totaled \$50.3 million. This was more than four times as much as Virginia received in 2014, when the award totaled \$11.5 million.
- The increase in awards peaked in FFY18 with an award totaling over \$85 million.
- Since FFY18, awards have declined, with Virginia's FFY22 award totaling \$36.7 million.

- States have three years, in addition to the award year, to expend VOCA funds. This has enabled DCJS to slowly increase subaward amounts and stretch the recent large VOCA awards across several SFY.
- Using this funding strategy, many grantees saw grant award increases, and new organizations received funding for the first time as well.
- This strategy also enabled DCJS to mitigate the impact of federal VOCA decreases and fluctuations on grantees.

 For SFY 2023, VOCA funds are used to support a total of 261 subawards through 6 grant programs.

• The SFY 2023 12-month VOCA obligation totals \$46,935,415.



VOCA Funding: The Bottom Line



With recent VOCA awards totaling \$26.7 million (FFY21) and \$36.8 million (FFY22), DCJS cannot continue to support annual VOCA obligations at current levels (\$46.9 million).

This necessitates the anticipated 10% reductions.

ICJR

- DCJS was recently awarded an Improving Criminal Justice Responses (ICJR) grant from the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)!
- This grant supports a statewide partnership among DCJS, Office of the Attorney General, Virginia Sexual and Domestic Violence Action Alliance, Virginia Poverty Law Center, and Virginia Victim Assistance Network.
- Grant is for three years of work related to training and resources for criminal justice and allied professionals on sexual and domestic violence.

SASP

- Current Calendar Year 2022 grants are in the 4th quarter of the 12-month grant. These grants end on 12/31/22.
- SASP annual report is due by January 15, 2023. Annual report form and instructions at <u>SASP Reporting</u>.
- CY 2022 budget amendment deadline is 11/17/22.
- CY 2023 applications have been reviewed and will be presented to the Criminal Justice Services Board in early December.

VSGP

 Current grants are in the second quarter of the second year of their two-year award.

 Status Reports for 7/1/22 – 9/30/22 are due in OGMS and the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)
 PMT system by 10/15/22. Claims for the same period are also due.

ARPA VSGP Restoration Funding

- Source of ARPA funding is U.S. Department of the Treasury (federal), awarded to Virginia and appropriated through the state budget.
- Recipients can request the entire award amount in advance. Contact your Grant Monitor for assistance.
- Once all funds are spent, mark the last claim as "Final."
 No additional claims are required for remainder of award period.
- Annual status report is required if any funds are spent between 7/1/22 - 6/30/23. Due 7/15/23.

ARPA VSGP Restoration Funding

- SFY 2022 awards were extended to June 30, 2023.
- New Statements of Grant Award (SOGA) for extensions were sent in early August. These must be signed and returned to DCJS.
- If your agency spent your full ARPA award prior to June 30, 2022, you marked your last claim as "final," and you did not get additional ARPA funds, you do not need to return the signed SOGA.

ARPA VSGP Restoration Funding

- Sexual and domestic violence agencies received additional funds for SFY 2023.
- To access the funds, recipients must submit a Contract Amendment in OGMS called Modified Award in order to add these funds into their current ARPA budget.
- Instructions for this process were emailed to impacted programs in early August with the updated SOGA.
- DCJS created a short video of how to complete a Modified Award Contract Amendment. A link to the video and the instructions are on the <u>DCJS ARPA webpage</u>.

VSTOP

 CY 2023 Continuation Award information will be available within the upcoming months.

• CY 2022 budget amendment deadline is November 17, 2022.

VSDVVF

 Status Reports are due via OGMS on 10/15/2022 (or next business day). Please use the correct reporting form based on Discretionary or Prosecution.

Do not report in PMT.
